

Hoarding in rooming houses is a dangerous trap

Rooming house operators are often confronted with hoarding by residents but are not necessarily aware of the dangers that this can cause to other residents and their business.

Julie Harris, Community Ageing Strategist for the Metropolitan Fire and Emergency Services Board, gave a graphic outline of the potential dangers that hoarding can create at RAAV's Annual General Meeting on 26th November.

Julie provided sound advice on how to identify clutter, assess the level of hoarding and develop a program to counter this threat. She has provided several links to help rooming house operators with this problem.

- Assess a level of hoarding,
- Engage an affected individual ,
- To develop policy and practice in relation to what actions need to occur in relation to specific levels of hoarding such as engaging the occupant, providing a warning, referral to other services, etc.
